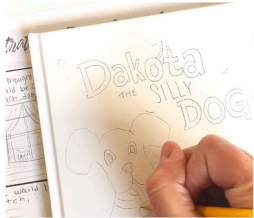




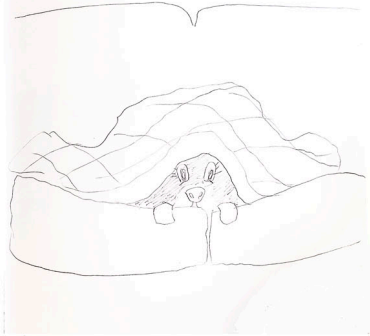
Draw the Design on Your Book

2. When you are finished outlining the cover with pencil, move on to illustrate the intro pages with pencil too.

3. Next, outline the events in order on the next set of pages. Try both showing and telling. Remember that if you tell through the pictures, you could use fewer words.



4. After that, continue illustrating all parts of the story until you get to the ending. What parts of the ending will you show, what will you tell?

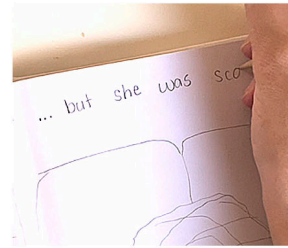
5. Draw the ending of the story using your storyboard sheet.

Decide if you want to make any changes as you draw. Sometimes things change as you work and that's OK.

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Add Your Text and Trace Lines

2. Once all of the words of your story are written in pencil, it's time to begin tracing the pictures with the thin marker.



Trace a few pages at a time if needed.

4. Go back over the lines with your eraser so the pencil lines do not show beneath your artwork.

5. Go back over and double any outlines to add emphasis or visual texture (a flat drawing that looks textured) to any objects in your story that should be fluffy, soft, knitted, etc.

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
